Art & Technology Is TIAA Activities Theme for 2011

Art & Technology will be the TIAA Activities Committee theme for its programs in 2011.

The theme surfaced because a number of activities involve either art or technology or some combination. A major example is the TIAA annual meeting May 18 at the Dallas Museum of Art, where retirees and TIAA members can view a special exhibit of American Indian art at no charge.

On June 9, a seminar at the Texins Activity Center will be designed to help those who want to know more about art appreciation. It will also give information on local resources for art training to improve your skills or possibly start a new hobby.

In August, TIAA will help facilitate the On My Own Time (OMOT) art competition at the Texins Activity Center. Retirees and their spouses are eligible to enter the contest. See the TIAA website, www.tialumni.org, for details on how to enter the contest.

For the TI Retiree Luncheon Nov. 9, the emphasis will be on both Art and Technology. The TI speaker will give an update on new technologies that are impacting everyday living and TI's contributions.

Several local art organizations will be invited to have booths at the luncheon, and retirees entering the OMOT contest will be invited to have their art on display.

Recognizing the growing connections of art and technology, the University of Texas at Dallas has established a joint program between the Erik Jonsson School of Engineering and Computer Science and the School of Arts and Humanities. The Art and Technology (ATEC) program is said to be the first comprehensive degree in Texas designed to explore and foster the convergence of computer science and engineering with creative arts and the humanities.

TIAA is working on a joint program with the retiree association of UT Dallas and hopes to include information about ATEC in a seminar later this year.

In view of all the connections, TIAA decided to focus on Art & Technology — particularly how this combination can improve the quality of life for retirees. Watch for details of upcoming events in the TIAA newsletters, eNews, eNotes, and our website, www.tialumni.org.

Dallas Museum of Art to Host TIAA Annual Meeting May 18

The TI Alumni Association will go to the Dallas Museum of Art for the 2011 TIAA annual membership meeting Wednesday, May 18.

Thanks to Texas Instruments, TIAA members can view a special exhibit of American Indian art at the DMA that day.

The free event will begin with a 12:30 p.m. reception, followed by the 1:15 p.m. meeting in the Horchow Auditorium. Bonnie Pitman, The Eugene McDermott Director of the DMA, will give an overview of the museum and its programs.

McDermotts to Be Cited

Special emphasis will be placed on the contributions of TI Founder Eugene McDermott and his widow, Margaret McDermott, who has been a major DMA supporter for more than 60 years. She recently donated four paintings from the McDermott collection to the DMA, including an important work by Monet.

Bonnie Pitman has been a leader in the art museum field for 25 years. She served as a curator, educator, and administrator at the University of California's Berkeley Art Museum, Seattle Art Museum, New Orleans Museum of Art, and Winnipeg Art Gallery. She joined the DMA in 2000 and was named director in 2008.

Following the brief business meeting to elect officers, attendees will be able to tour the DMA and the special exhibit, *Art of the American Indians: The Thaw Collection*. The exhibition will feature 135 works of art from the renowned Eugene and Clare Thaw Collection of American Indian Art at the Fenimore Art Museum in Cooperstown, NY. Meet Larry James, TIAA Executive VP

Larry James, TI Alumni Association executive vice president, joined TIAA as a lifetime member in May 1999 — the same month as TIAA's first annual meeting.

"I was living in California when I heard about the creation of TIAA from Max Post," Larry said. "I joined immediately, and until I moved back to Dallas in 2004, the TIAA newsletters and website proved a great way to stay in touch with the company and my TI friends."

Most of Larry's 29-year TI career was in the control and finance area — both in Semiconductor and the Defense business — and in Corporate Investor Relations.

After his time at TI, Larry enjoyed a second career with a Singapore-based wafer fab company as investor

relations vice president.

Upon retirement, Larry returned to Dallas and volunteered on the TI retiree history team, working on the archives project and the integrated circuit 50th anniversary celebration. Meanwhile he continues to be active in financial ventures, including international consulting projects.

Served as TIAA Treasurer

For two years, Larry served as TIAA treasurer. He was elected executive vice president in 2010 and is up for reelection at the 2011 annual meeting May 18.

Born and raised in Cleveland, Ohio, Larry attended the same high school as Sharon — his wife of 43 years. He went to Ohio State University, spending his first two years in engineering.

Then he transferred to the business school, where he completed a BS in Business.

Larry joined TI in 1968 right out of college. He said, "The economy was strong, and it was a good year to graduate. I had quite a few job offers, but TI really stood out. What impressed me was the excitement at TI. The entire global semiconductor industry was less than \$2 billion that year, compared to about \$300 billion today, and the opportunities for growth were everywhere. You could just sense it in my conversations with the people at TI."

Initially, Larry was a manufacturing engineer (product planner) in the TTL integrated circuit business in the South Building. The business grew

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rapidly, and in about six months, the operations were moved to Houston.

About six months later, Larry was drafted into the Army. He served two years mostly in Washington, DC, working in the office of Joint Chiefs of Staff in the Pentagon.

Returning to Houston with TI in 1972, Larry again was in production planning.

A year later, he moved to finance and spent most of the remainder of his career in that function. He had about a dozen positions in the Semiconductor business, two in Defense Systems and one in Corporate.


Many Relocations

“All the relocations in the early years of our marriage were useful training for my wife and me,” Larry said. “We’ve moved between cities 13 times, including five moves to Dallas. However, the house we lived in the longest was in Tokyo, where I was finance vice president for TI Japan for seven years.”

After returning from Japan in 1993, Larry worked with Max Post in Corporate in Investor Relations. Then in 1995, he became Defense Systems business group controller. Two years later, TI sold the business to Raytheon. Larry retired from Raytheon in 1998.

In 1999, a former TIER was named CEO of Chartered Semiconductor, an SC foundry in Singapore. He recruited Larry as investor relations vice president. Most investors were in the U.S., so Larry based himself in the San Jose, CA, office. This was also close to the Silicon Valley semiconductor analysts who followed the company. Larry did that job through 2004, when he retired again.

Since then, Larry has done investor relations and finance consulting jobs for multinational semiconductor companies headquartered outside the U.S. The most recent one was for a large semiconductor company based in the Netherlands, which was spun off from

Philips Electronics.

Larry enjoys his involvement in TIAA. “The team does a great job organizing interesting events and activities and providing opportunities for former TIers to connect with one another as well as give back to the community through volunteer service,” he said. “Whether it’s large events — like the annual TI Retiree Luncheon or seminars at the Plano Center — or a small breakfast get-together, there are TIAA events almost every week that provide a way for members to re-connect with other members whom they may have lost touch with over the years.

“TIAA also works hard seeking ways to better serve its members and to attract new members. For example, we began webcasting select seminars so that members could view them online. I took advantage of that myself last year and listened to one of our seminars while I was in Europe,” Larry said.

Larry and Sharon James have two sons, one in the advertising industry in Dallas and the other living in Austin and working for a U.S. Senator. They have three grandchildren.

Going to Senior Day at the Capitol

The Senior Source invited us to go on their Feb. 8 Senior Day trip to the Capitol in Austin to voice concerns to the Texas Legislature about the upcoming budget.

The trip included transportation, lunch, snacks and a great experience for only \$20 each. This sounded like a good deal to my wife, Linda, and me.

The catch was the 5:30 a.m. departure time. We had to get up at 4 a.m., but we decided the opportunity was worth it. We thought of inviting friends, but couldn't think of anyone crazy enough to get up that early!

Arriving at The Senior Source at 5:15 a.m., we found three buses ready to roll. We boarded one and anticipated imminent departure. The buses left at 6 a.m., and we proceed-

ed south on I-35 to Austin, hoping to arrive before activities started at 10:30 a.m. I thought we left rather early until we made the dreaded pit stop in Waco. It was like a black hole that lasted 45 minutes.

After Waco, a staff member distributed packets with maps of the Capitol building, grounds and surrounding area (in case anyone wandered down the wrong road). The most important item was the message we should share with our representatives and senators.

The Senior Source and Texas Senior Advocacy Coalition (TSAC) had five concerns: mandatory geriatric training for health care practitioners, funding for assisted living ombudsmen, no cuts in Medicaid reimbursement, reinstated utility assistance for seniors of modest means, and full funding for home-delivered meals. We were to

search out our representatives and focus on one or two topics.

At the Capitol, we walked to the south entrance to hear several speakers supporting our cause. Seniors came from Houston, San Antonio, Austin and Fort Worth. After the speeches, we explored the grounds, had lunch, and took a guided tour. Because Governor Rick Perry was presenting his "State of the State" speech, we couldn't view his office.

After leaving our guide, we took the stairs to the fourth floor and met with a member of Senator John Carona's staff. (He was in a Finance Committee meeting). She was very patient and cordial as we discussed our concerns.

Next we found our way to Rep. Angie Chen Button's office. The challenge was finding the stairwell in the basement that led to the first floor sub-basement in the Capitol Extension. From there we went down one more floor and headed north. Angie was not available, so we discussed our concerns with her staff member, who was also cordial and patient.

Senator Carona's office is on the Capitol building fourth floor. Representative Button's office is on the second floor sub-basement level of the capitol extension. Hers was one of the

furthest offices away from the House Chamber. Senator Carona had four flights of stairs to descend to get to the Senate Chamber. I now know the difference between being a senator with seniority and a representative serving her second term!

We continued our tour, stopping to check out the gift shop in the Capitol extension. We walked around the grounds looking at the memorials surrounding the Capitol. The 3 p.m. departure time was near. The buses arrived on time, and then we sat waiting for two riders of our bus. They were 20 minutes late. Their senator gave them bad directions and sent them out the wrong Capitol door I asked if they planned to vote for him again.

We arrived back in Dallas shortly after 7 p.m. It was a full day, but we both agreed the trip was worth it. We were surprised no other TIAA members were on the trip.

I told Lynda Enders of The Senior Source that we were writing this article. She said she hoped next year TIAA would fill a bus!! That's a challenge we should take seriously. Please join us next year!
