We will donate 100 percent of the book sales to the United Way campaign as we are underwriting the book's production costs.


TIAA thanks members for their past support. This year, we want to increase the number of members who become United Way donors and volunteers.

Q: *What's your involvement with United Way and why have you chosen to work on TIAA's effort?*

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TIAA's Bob Townsend Mayor of Richardson

Bob Townsend, a TI retiree and TIAA member, is the new Richardson mayor.

First elected to the Richardson City Council in 2001, Bob previously was mayor pro tem in 2007-2011. Council members elected Bob mayor after the May 14, 2011, city election.

As Richardson mayor, Bob succeeds Gary Slagel, also a former Tier. Gary did not seek re-election to the council.

Bob was born and raised in Durant, OK, graduating from Durant High School as one of the top three honor graduates. He attended the University of Oklahoma and completed his BS degree at Southeastern Oklahoma State University. He has an MBA degree from Southern Methodist University.

In 1959, he joined TI as a Semiconductor Division computer programmer. His first office was in the basement of the second level of the Central Research Laboratories Building. Only half of the present SC Building was built then.

"Those were hectic and exciting times working under all the pipes in the basement," Bob said. "In fact, one morning when we arrived, a rattlesnake was under one of the machines."

Bob's TI assignments included computer programming, systems development, computer operations management and network management. His major assignments include

management of the central computing facility in the SC Building, installation of systems in TI's domestic and international facilities, and management of TI's worldwide terminal network in his last five years as an active Tier.

He retired from TI in 1997 after 37 years of service.

Bob has long been active in homeowners associations, serving as president of the Southwestern Richardson Homeowners Association and the Richland Meadows Neighborhood Association.

He and his wife, Lynn, also from Durant, have lived in Richardson ever since he came to work for TI. They raised four children and have seven grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. Their daughter Valerie is married to Lewis McMahan, a TIAA past president

Skinnie Holbert: TIAA Legendary Life Member

For legendary GSIs Murrell "Skinnie" Holbert, becoming a TI Alumni Association lifetime member capped his 97-year life.

This year, Skinnie mailed TIAA a check for a three-year membership renewal. But, when Jessica Stewart, TIAA administrator, noted Skinnie's 1913 birth date, TIAA returned the check and awarded Skinnie lifetime membership.

Skinnie was to be introduced at the May 18 TIAA annual meeting, "He was so excited about coming to the meeting," said his daughter, Mindy Hyde of Irving, TX.

Regrettably, fate intervened. Skinnie had a heart attack two days before the meeting and died May 19, the day after the meeting.

The story of Skinnie's harrowing escape from Sumatra – just ahead of the invading Japanese army when World War II started – is told in *Engineering the World: Stories From the First 75 Years of Texas Instruments*, which TI published in 2005.

In 1937, Skinnie joined Geophysical Service Inc. (GSI), the seismic exploration company from which Texas Instruments evolved. He worked on U.S. prospects before his assignment to Saudi Arabia from 1938 to 1940. Then he served on U.S. crews until early 1941, when he accepted the Sumatra assignment.

GSI's jungle crew got an announcement from a messenger, arriving by foot, that the Japanese had bombed Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941. A week later, a second messenger brought

instructions to evacuate.

Skinnie and fellow GSIs L.C. Craig crossed over to Batavia (now Jakarta) and took a train to Surabaya. After several weeks, passage was arranged on a Dutch freighter. Two days out, a Japanese submarine torpedoed the ship. Skinnie and L.C. were rescued from a lifeboat by an Australian admiral's yacht.

They returned to Java and later boarded a British ship that reached Ceylon (now Sri Lanka). They continued to India by ferry, went by rail to Karachi and by seaplane to Bahrain. Then they went by bus to Dammam, Saudi Arabia, and safety with a GSI crew.

Skinnie left Saudi Arabia for Dallas in late 1942. He accepted a three-year assignment to Colombia in 1943. Skinnie returned to Dallas in 1946 to work in the GSI Personnel Department.

In 1947, Skinnie married Grace Mary Jostrand, who was secretary to Cecil Green, GSI operations vice president.

His next assignment was in Mexico. He returned to Dallas in 1949 and later came back to Mexico City as party chief of a crew based in Poza Rica.

From 1956 to 1971, Skinnie was based in Bogotá, Colombia, as manager of GSI operations in Colombia, northern South America and the Caribbean area. He returned to Mexico in 1971, serving as manager until he retired in 1973. He consulted for GSI on a part-time basis from 1975 to 1982.

for others."



Carbajal Wins Network Volunteer Award

Barney Carbajal was stunned to hear himself named as the volunteer of the year while attending the 2011 Richardson non-profit Network of Community Ministries annual dinner meeting at the DoubleTree Hotel in March.

Apparently, Barney was the only one of the 300 persons in the room who was surprised. Barney has been volunteering for Network since 1998, and had put in "oh, a couple of thousand hours," he modestly estimates.

This low-profile charity is big and efficient. It assists over 45,000 Richardson-area people each year with a small paid staff and 700 volunteers. Their food pantry handles a half-million pounds of food a year.

Barney's special niche is trucking bread from bakeries and supermarkets to Network's pantry. His personal best is

admitted to be a single load of 900 pounds of bread in his large SUV.

Dr. Barney Carbajal joined TI in 1961 and retired after a high-tech career in 1996. His last 10 years at TI were his most enjoyable, says Barney. He was manager of Customer Quality in the Application Specific Integrated Circuit (ASIC) group making custom microchips. His job required intense communication with the customers, and he especially liked "the personal satisfaction of turning customers into friends of TI."

During this busy time, he also managed the ASIC co-op program, juggling up to 30 student/employees, mostly from Texas A&M, who were shuffling their semesters between school and jobs at TI. Barney feels that his biggest contribution to TI was the 90% of the co-ops who stayed on as employees.

Not long into retirement, Barney ran into his TI friend, Bob Estle, also retired. Bob was volunteering at Network and, by 1998, so was Barney.

Although Barney's favorite job is the bread pickup, he keeps his fingers in other Network activities as well, such as running their charity golf tournament for three years, and last year, manning Network's booth at the TIAA annual luncheon meeting. When pressed for details of his "job" with Network, he admits he most enjoys his interaction with the people who donate the bread.
