Making Reservations

Admission to the luncheon is \$15 per person if paid in advance or \$25 if paid at the door. Make checks payable to TIAA and mail to P.O. Box 740181, Dallas, TX 75374. Each retiree may

invite one guest to the event at the same price.

Name tags will be issued at the event entrance with separate registration tables for prepaid attendees and those paying at the door.

The invitation packet was mailed in early October. It included a map and a reservation form for the luncheon, optional vegetarian plate, bus transportation, physically challenged parking, and flu and pneumonia immunizations.

Driving Instructions

The Mesquite Convention Center is located at 1700 Rodeo Dr., Mesquite, TX 75149, between the Hampton Inn and Resistol Arena, and is accessible from LBJ Freeway (I-635).

From southbound LBJ Freeway, exit at Military Parkway/Scyene Rd. (Exit 4). Stay on the service road and

go through two traffic lights. Veer right onto Rodeo Center Blvd. Turn right on Rodeo Drive and left into the parking lot.

From northbound LBJ Freeway, take the Military Parkway/Scyene Rd. exit. Go left under I-635 and turn left onto the southbound service road. Turn right on Rodeo Drive and left into the parking lot. Regular and handicapped parking will be available for those who prefer to drive.

Bus Transportation

Retirees who don't want to drive to the event may make reservations to ride free shuttle buses, departing from Texins Activity Centers: Sherman at 8:30 a.m.; Spring Creek at 9:15 a.m.; and the Dallas Expressway Site at 9:30 a.m. Buses will leave the convention center at 2:30 p.m. or when all riders are aboard.

Flu & Pneumonia Shots

Seasonal flu immunization will be offered at \$24. Medicare Part B and

TI Blue Cross Blue Shield PPO insurance cover the cost of this immunization. Pneumonia immunization is available at \$65 and is covered by Medicare Part B, once every five years.

You must bring your Medicare Card for the shots if covered by Medicare Part B. If you are not on Medicare Part B you will need to have your retiree badge. If you are a spouse/dependent of a TI retiree you must bring your Medicare Card for the above shots if covered by Medicare Part B or your TI BCBS PPO card if not on Medicare. If a spouse or dependent is on any other plan they will need to pay \$24 in cash or check for the shot and file for reimbursement from their insurer.

Other Medical Tests

Enclosed with the invitation was a flyer listing medical screening tests to be offered by RightPath Health Screening and their cost. Call 1-800-770-0240 toll free to make appointments for tests. Fees for these medical services are payable by cash or check to the vendor at the event.

Gary Stopani, TIAA Treasurer

Gary and Linda Stopani decided to get involved with the TI Alumni Association once they realized the variety of activities that TIAA offers. Their first experience was a trip to Big Bend. "We spent a week with the Brandenburgs and Hettlers. Seeing what great people they were, made our decision to become active easy" said Gary, now in his second term as TIAA treasurer.

Gary lived his formative years in the frozen tundra of Rochester, NY. His career started after graduating from Edison Tech in 1970. He entered an engineering apprenticeship with Gleason Works, maker of gear-cutting equipment. The program involved alternating one quarter attending Rochester Institute of Technology and two quarters working in different departments. At the end of four years, he had 4 years of industry experience and an associate degree in Mechanical Technology.

He continued working at Gleason Works in the drafting department while attending night school and graduated in 1978 with a BS degree in Mechanical/Industrial Engineer-

ing. After graduation, he was promoted to the product improvement department.

Seeking Warmer Weather

One February night in 1981, after taking 1½ hours to drive 6 miles in 15-degree weather, he contacted a head hunter to pursue positions south of the Mason-Dixon Line. At the time, the oil industry was going strong so Gary interviewed with Oil Well, a division of U.S. Steel. He accepted their offer and the family moved to Garland, TX, in April of that year.

When the oil industry went bust in 1983, Gary eventually came to work for TI in DSEG as a tooling engineer. Over the course of the next nearly 25 years, he had assignments in manufacturing and finance in the Defense business, Information Systems & Services, Corporate and Semiconductor. During his time in DSEG, he earned his MBA from SMU in 1985.


Financial Experience

With his finance background in Corporate and SC, Gary was knowl-

edgeable enough to be recruited as church treasurer. He held this position for 6 years in a small congregation. He and Linda transferred to another church – King of Glory Lutheran Church. Orene Beck Remembers Buckner

TIAA member Orene Beck is one of a number of TIAA volunteers who help process donated material at Shoes for Orphan Souls, a Buckner ministry that provides new shoes and socks to orphans and at-risk children worldwide. But, Orene has a special relationship with Buckner. She grew up at the Buckner Orphan Home in Dallas. Here is Orene's story in her own words.

Growing Up at Buckner

There were originally six siblings in my family; one died at the age of four months. The way I understand it, my father just got tired of trying to feed six hungry mouths during the Depression, and hopped on a bus one day, leaving my mother and all six kids. She had no alternative but to seek a place for us.

My mother put five of us – two boys and three girls – in the "Home," which is the way all the Bucknerites called Buckner Orphans Home. Mother, however, made sure we kids knew she loved us. As often as possible, she came to visit us on Sunday afternoons, when visitors were allowed on campus.

At that time, all "orphans" were housed in a dorm according to their age. The boys were on one side of the campus and the girls on the other side. Therefore, we girls were unable to see our brothers except when we went to the dining hall and during school and church functions.

Since we were housed in dorms according to our ages, most of the time I didn't even see my sisters. But, we girls were able to visit on Sunday afternoons, allowing us to keep close contact with the female side of the family. It is truly amazing to me that my siblings and I have remained very close all these years.

I was about 4 years of age when I went into the home, and lived there (except for a couple of years and that is another story) until I graduated in 1960. This was the last year that Buckner had an academy. I have the distinction of being the last person to graduate from Buckner Orphans Home Academy.

Life after Buckner

When we graduated, Buckner made sure each graduate had a place to go, either a job or to college with a full scholarship. I took advantage of the scholarship at first, but found out very soon that I wanted to do something that I would enjoy more.

Although I didn't take full advantage of the scholarships, one of my brothers and two of my sisters did. The oldest brother became a neurosurgeon, a brigadier general, and, at the age of 55, obtained his medical law degree. My youngest brother joined the Marines and remained in the service for 16 years. My two sisters became teachers. One received the Ross Perot Award; the other was twice named Teacher of the Year at her school in Waxahachie. In all probability, this would not have happened if we had not been placed in the Home.

I started work at TI in 1984 in the SC Purchasing Department. For the first ten years, I worked in Leadframes, buying leadframes for the different fabs. Then, TI developed the Silicon Group, and I bought and

moved wafers to the fabs. TI was very good to me and for me. I was able to continue to work in this group until I had to retire in 2004 due to medical reasons. Thanks again, TI, for your faith in me.

After I retired, I was sick for a while so I didn't immediately join TIAA. But, I saw that TIAA works hard to make a difference in the community. I then joined TIAA and started volunteering to go to Greet the Troops at DFW. This is always such a very moving experience. If you haven't done it, you should give it a try.

This year, I saw that TIAA was volunteering to help with the Shoes for Orphan Souls. My husband and I have been volunteering at Buckner's at the end of December to organize the toys and clothes that are donated. So, we decided to also volunteer for this activity.

How Does This Affect Me?

When I lived at Buckner, I remember getting new shoes twice a year – once when school started and again at Easter when we would get a whole new outfit. This was always a very exciting time of year since we were able to go to the warehouse and try on the shoes. Granted, we only got shoes

we called brogans, but, they were new.

This is what I think about when I think of the Shoes for Orphan Souls program. I see children that don't have anything and don't expect to get anything. Then, someone comes to them, washes their feet and puts new socks and shoes on their feet. How their faces must light up, knowing there is someone who really cares.

I can relate just a little bit to how they must feel, even though we had three square meals a day (most of these children don't get even one meal every two or three days), we had schooling that could take us as far in life as we wanted to go and we had a roof over our heads (neither of which these children have any thought of obtaining). So I can relate to them in a small way and feel the need to give back by volunteering my time.

I am married to a terrific guy, Jerry Beck. I have two boys from a previous marriage, three grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. We all live in the Dallas area, as well as both of my sisters and one of my brothers. Another brother lives in Austin.

I hope this has opened someone's eyes to the great need that is in our world and how that need is being responded to by Buckner Benevolences. Due to the large demand, all volunteers are deeply appreciated. To volunteer, contact TIAA at admin@tialumni.org or 214-567-8444.

years, the visiting luminaries included Howard Hughes, Joe Louis, Bonnie & Clyde, Jack Dempsey, Dean Martin, Frank Sinatra, Buster Keaton, W.C. Fields, Gene Autry, Will Rogers, Hedy Lamarr, Lana Turner, Bugsy Siegel, Tommy Dorsey, Mae West, Walter Winchell, Tom Mix and John Wayne. Ginger Rogers, a local girl, used to dance here and Jack Ruby gambled here. We will depart Texins at 10:30 a.m., eat lunch at Catfish Sam’s in Arlington at our own expense, enjoy a 90-minute history lesson and a guided, easy-walking tour beginning at 1 p.m. and return about 4 p.m. Cost is \$15 for members and \$17 for nonmembers.

Dallas Museum of Art Basement Tour, Dallas, Tuesday, Jan. 17 – Join us for an once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to view the fabulous art stored in the basement of the DMA. Close to 80% of the artwork owned by the museum is not on display but stored safely for later use.
