

Retiree Luncheon Celebrates 40th Anniversary of the Datamath Calculator

Considering that the theme of the TI Retiree Luncheon held at the Mesquite Convention Center on November 1, 2012 was the celebration of the 40th anniversary of TI's first consumer product, it was very appropriate that the main speaker was Melendy Lovett, TI's Senior Vice President and the President of TI Educational Technology, which produces TI's current consumer electronic products.

Over the last 40 years, the name of the organization producing TI's consumer products has changed several times. It was called Consumer Group from 1972 through 1994, Personal Productivity Products from 1994 through 1997, Educational & Productivity Solutions from 1997 through 2004 and Education Technology from 2004 through the present.

State of TI Business

Melendy briefly reviewed TI's overall business, reporting that TI's 2011 revenue by segment broke down as follows: Analog \$6.4B, Embedded Processing \$2.1B, Wireless \$2.5B and Other (including Educational Technology) \$2.7B.

TI has manufacturing, design or sales facilities in more than 35 countries serving over 90,000 customers worldwide.

TI Consumer Products

But she quickly switched to a review of TI's consumer products

over the last 40 years.

Of course, the introduction of the TI Datamath Calculator in 1972 was covered in some detail and the principal engineers involved in this seminal product were introduced and received a well deserved round of applause.


Other significant firsts for TI were the TI-52 programmable calculator in 1975, the Little Professor educational toy in 1976, the Speak & Spell in 1978, the TI-Explorer (the first instructional calculator developed with the help of teachers) in 1987, the TI-81 graphing calculator for math and science in 1990 and the TI Navigator classroom learning system in 2001.

Melendy covered TI's current Nspire line of products beginning with the TI-Nspire Handheld graphing calculator with clickpad in 2007, the TI-Nspire Navigator System in 2010 and the TI-Nspire CX handheld graphing calculator and software.

Melendy thanked everyone present who had worked to develop, manufacture or market any of these products and asked them to stand and be recognized by those attending the luncheon. A significant percentage of the attendees stood for this honor.

Gary is an avid Carter Blood Care donor with a donation of blood every eight weeks.

Gary is connected with Dallas Ramps, an organization that builds freedom for homebound individuals, many of whom are seniors. Gary works at Dallas Ramps two to three times a month and has contributed to 200 successful ramp builds a year.

In addition to Gary's commitment to serve, willingness to share his talents and expertise, can-do and will-do attitude, time given to community service projects and church duties, Gary thinks of others first, contributes to solutions and bridges together different organizations to support one another through simple ways that make a big difference!

An example of Gary's endearing qualities involves a service activity at Dolphin Heights Community Garden in South Fair Park Dallas. While fighting the summer heat and working on many garden chores, Gary listened to TIAA

Community Involvement Team members discussing an idea and immediately offered a plan of action.

Many of the RSVP community garden partners have a need for volunteers to donate and make wood or other outdoor signage to label their plots similar to the ones at Dolphin Heights Community Garden.

From his volunteer work at Dallas Ramps, he pointed out that there is scrap wood that they throw away. Gary offered to save the scrap wood, cut it to size for the name plates and make stakes to post the garden signs. Since then with the permission of Dallas Ramps, Gary has cut and donated 122 garden signs and stakes for community gardens in Dallas and Collin counties. Sixty-two signs have been painted and are in the staking process.

The first set of garden signs were made by seniors of all physical levels and aptitudes at a rehabilitation and care center. A break from their traditional activities, painting and creating signs that will adorn community spaces brought a youthful spirit, confidence and joy to the seniors, many confined to the center. Gary is responsible for that happy memory because he selflessly gives just a couple of extra hours a month to cut wood

Dallas County GOP Women Honor TI Retiree Dot Adler with Award

TI retiree Dot Adler was honored with the 2012 Dallas County Council of Republican Women's Anita Hill Lifetime Achievement Award Dec. 4.

The award recognized Dot's more than 50 years of volunteer work for the GOP in Dallas County and is named for the late State Representative Anita Hill of Garland. The council is an umbrella group composed of the county's 15 federated Republican women's clubs.

Dot began volunteering in her precinct in 1960. She joined the Dallas Downtown Republican Women's Club in 1964 and has been president six times. For the Dallas County Council of Republican Women, she has been treasurer, recording secretary and publicity director. Also, she was Texas Federation of Republican

2013 Retiree Luncheon Survey Results

About 72 percent of registrants at the 2012 TI Retiree Luncheon turned in surveys at the event.

We received many positive comments about our Speaker, Melendy Lovett, TI Senior Vice President and President, TI Education Technology and the product display ranging from the 1972 TI Datamath Calculator to the current line of Nspire products.

Interesting Statistics

Some interesting statistics derived from the survey:

- 18 percent of attendees travelled 50 miles or more to attend the event.
- 10 percent were attending a TI Retiree Luncheon for the first time.
- 97 percent of those responding liked the event overall.
- 96 percent would return to the Mesquite site next year.
- 47 percent of the retirees said that they preferred being contacted via

email, 36 percent preferred US mail and 17 percent had no preference.

- 22 percent reported that they had attended a TIAA Seminar, 16 percent had gone on a Travel event and 7 percent had participated in a TIAA-sponsored Community Involvement or volunteer event.

Helpful Suggestions

Many suggestions were received for improving future Retiree Luncheons including possible sites such as Plano Centre, Southfork Ranch and Downtown Dallas. Suggestions for future Seminars, Travel events and Community Involvement projects have been forwarded to the respective committees in charge of these activities to assist their planning.
