

TIAA Annual Meeting to be at the George W. Bush Presidential Center

The TI Alumni Association annual meeting will be held at the beautiful new George W. Bush Presidential Center on the Southern Methodist University Campus on Thursday, May 9.

Located on a 24-acre site, the center is comprised of the Presidential Library and Museum and the Bush Institute. According to the website, the Bush Presidential Library and Museum includes a 14,000 square-foot permanent exhibit, as well as temporary exhibit space. The permanent exhibit includes a full-scale replica of the Oval Office, a Texas rose garden modeled on the rose garden at the White House, and Decision Points Theater.

Outside the entrance of the permanent exhibit is Freedom Hall.

Flooded with natural light from above, Freedom Hall features a unique, 360-degree, high-definition video wall. The National Archives and Records Administration provides a research room for scholars and classrooms for school groups, which includes a recreation of the Situation Room at the White House.

Program for Meeting

TIAA will meet in the Bush Institute, not normally open to the general public. We will meet in the Ballroom with its stunning views of the Bush Center's 15-acre urban park and the downtown Dallas skyline for a reception and refreshments beginning at 1:00 p.m. The institute entrance is on the west side of the complex, off Dublin Street, which is being renamed Bush Avenue.

The meeting itself will begin at

1:30 p.m. in the beautiful, state-of-the-art Auditorium with remarks by TIAA President George Consolver, followed by a presentation by a senior official of the Bush Center.

Dedicated on April 25, the center opened to the public on May 1. We are fortunate to be one of the first organizations to use these facilities for a group meeting. Following the meeting, we will tour the museum before boarding buses for the return trip to the Texins Activity Center.

How to Get There

The parking at the Presidential Center is extremely limited and is not near the west entrance to the Bush Institute. Therefore, TIAA will run buses from the Dallas Texins Activity Center on the Expressway Site leaving at 12:30 p.m. The buses will depart the Bush Center no later than 4:00 p.m., returning to Texins.

If the Bush Center parking lots are full, which is likely, the next closest parking on the SMU Campus will be in the Moody Parking Garage. Go to www.bushcenter.org/plan-your-visit/directions-and-parking for options and for links to SMU parking information.

SMU has announced that, as of May 1, they will be running free shuttle buses at 15 minute intervals from Mockingbird Station that will stop at both entrances to the Bush Center. Be sure to get off at the stop adjacent to the Bush Institute entrance.

Mockingbird Station is served by the North Central segment of the DART Rail Red, Orange and Blue lines. Facilities include free commuter parking spaces. A senior day pass on DART costs \$2.50.

Don't miss this opportunity to tour the new George W. Bush Library and Museum, visit with friends, and enjoy the meeting.

New TIAA Website Being Developed

A long-needed project to modernize TIAA's website is actively underway. Our present website, created in 2003 and modified several times over the years, is no longer adequate to support the ever-broadening activities of the Alumni Association.

Former TIAA President Ronnie Brandenburg proposed the creation of a completely new website and the Executive Committee agreed to fund it. Then-President, Betty Purkey, appointed an ad hoc committee to guide this effort. This committee consists of Ronnie Brandenburg, Chair; John Byers; Jon Campbell; Larry James; Mauricio Oporto; Jessica Stewart; and Linda Stopani. After a chance meeting with Barbara Erickson at a TIAA seminar, Ronnie realized that Barbara, a recent TI retiree, had a key skill set needed for this project.

Website Update

Barbara, who kindly agreed to con-

tribute her talents on a volunteer basis, had managed application migrations at TI, including the HR Benefits Systems. Barbara brought a similar approach to managing TIAA's member tracking and management system. Through Barbara's contacts, Peter Petrik and Mark Hanna of Skvare, LLC (pronounced Square) were hired as consultants during the implementation stage and to host the website.

This is truly a TIAA-wide effort. In addition to work by members of the ad hoc committee, all TIAA officers and committee chairs are updating content for their respective areas.

The new website will have a clean and fresh look with much improved navigation, making it easier for members to access information about TIAA's many activities and offerings.

Member Database

Our TIAA member database, comprising thousands of members and retirees, is closely integrated with our website and also needed upgrading. The committee agreed with Barbara's

suggestion that a new database should be developed using CiviCRM, an open-source data management tool geared to non-profit organizations.

Barbara has been in charge of the migration of data from the old database to the new one, devoting hundreds of hours to this complex task.

Our Administrator, Jessica Stewart, whose duties include maintaining the database, is also spending a considerable amount of time and effort on this migration, as are members of the Membership Committee: Hector Cardenas, Leroy Foster, Mauricio Oporto and Bill Stearns.

At 92, Wilson Publishes Book on Kindle

Native Texan John Wilson was born to write. He began writing some 80 years ago, and now, at 92, has just e-published a new collection of his stories, *Tales From Texas Past*, available from the Amazon Kindle Store on line at amazon.com/kindle.

He began writing early, and was editor of the Navasota High School newspaper. He parlayed this experience into writing local news and sports for small-town newspapers, and then slaved as a "stringer" for the Houston Post. Soon, SMU beckoned John to work in their publicity office, where he also found time to "get in a couple of semesters" of college.

The rude interruption of WWII ended with John commanding a rifle platoon in the 1st Marine Division on Okinawa after 82 days of combat. Homeward bound? The Marines thought not, and John spent another year of service in China, for "repatriation duty."

In 1947, John was back at SMU where he completed his BA English degree and began on his Masters. He also began teaching English to engineering students. John was tapped once again by Uncle Sam and sent back to war in Korea. After a year of frostbite, it was declared that fighting in two wars was enough, and John could go home.

TI Experience

John signed on with GSI in December, 1952, and started his long and successful career on the first working day of 1953. He began work in GSI public relations and advertising. Then, good luck smiled when a TI annual report stalled out, and John was brought into TI to assist in the rewrite. It must have gone well, since John moved to "various jobs," including TIOLR, TI's own world-wide information system. John was the brains behind TIOLR's T-News, the smash-hit "electronic newspaper" for Tiers.

John's official TI career ended in

1985 as Manager of Internal Communications. A few years later, he tacked on another ten years of consulting at TI, as he says, "as a bridge to real retirement." Not surprisingly, he was immediately tapped by Max Post in 2004 to join the team to produce *Engineering the World*, TI's 75th anniversary book.

Writing Fiction

Those who know John from his years at TI may be surprised to find that his secret vice is, and has always been, writing fiction. His early fiction, in high school, won prizes, and gave him an idea that maybe he could write pretty well, and that writing could be the key to "escape the pea-patch," in his words. And it was.

Tales From Texas Past is a collection of John Wilson's fiction, written from the 1930s to the 1950s. The novel, *High John the Conqueror*, was written for his Master of Arts thesis at SMU, and was published in 1948 by Macmillan. Following publication, John was elected to the prestigious Texas Institute of Letters, which included J. Frank Dobie, among other authors.

These tales are from a period of great change in Texas, and the times he describes so well are now far in the past. John Wilson writes of these times as a master of description — he doesn't invite you into the scene, he drags you into it. You're caught up in the action like a bystander walking onto the stage of a play as the lights come up.

As you read, you see the surroundings and meet the people, you smell the smells and hear the sounds—the odor of the sweaty leather saddle and the clink of the trace chains, the grunting of the mules and the grit on the hoe handle. I could feel the sweat rolling down my back. John has a way of pulling you into a story like none other. And John knows of what he writes. He was there.

In commenting on the OMOT competition, Ted said, "OMOT is a great opportunity for TI artists, active and retired, to show their work and to see what other TI artists are doing. It is a supportive environment for beginners as well as a significant show for the advanced and for professionals."


