

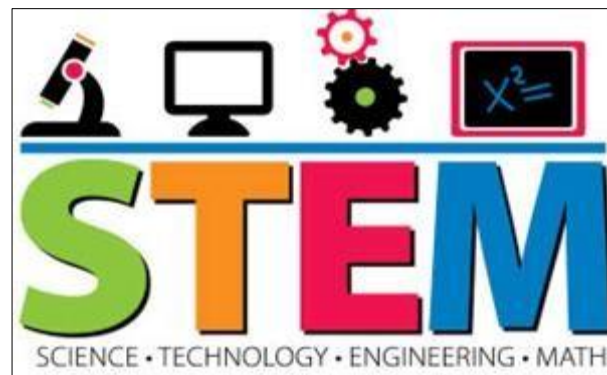

## Bringing STEM to Students

WalkSTEM is a new program being launched this spring in the Dallas Arts District and in NorthPark Center planned by talkStem. They are looking for energetic, open-minded, and creative people with an interest in promoting STEM among youth in engaging ways by making connections to the world around us. The walks are inspired by the National Museum of Mathematics in New York. The Museum's Founder and Director, Glen Whitney, has designed a series of site-specific math walks across the country. Dr Whitney, will be training a



group of docents on February 23 at NorthPark at 4:30 pm for an hour by leading them on a math walk in NorthPark highlighting the math that is embedded in the significant art collection in the mall. ## TIAA Travel Events

**January Travel Recap:** Seventeen TIAA members/guests registered for the Hatco Factory Tour on January 17 and it was as fabulous as their hats! We were welcomed by one of Hatco's VPs and



learned that all the Stetson and Resistol hats are made in the USA – in Texas, with one factory in Longview and one in Garland – and then shipped to distributors all over the world. We passed around a top-of-the-line (containing chinchilla fur), custom-made hat that was so soft. Hats like that are worn by rodeo and screen stars and cost \$5,000+ (depending on how much bling they want on the hat band!) Hats are not commonly worn these days but Hatco

still produces between 500,000 and 1,000,000 hats each year to please their customers and have 3,200 models and colors available – in felt or straw. They employ approximately 225 workers – some workers, like at TI, are multi-generational and some have been there over 40 years. As usual, we maintained the TIAA custom of eating-our-way-across-Texas and Dos Banderos in Garland was the winner this time as we joined one of our members in celebrating his 92nd birthday!

**February 10, Witherspoon Distillery, Lewisville** – 1:30 to 6:30 pm, Friday. Distilling is a labor of love and during the tour you will learn the history of distilling, their history as a distillery and the processes they use to produce spirits. This business is ranked #1 on the list of 29 things to do in Lewisville and the education on distilling is worth the time! We will board a bus at 1:30 pm, have lunch at On The Border (at own expense) and take the 4:00 pm guided tour which lasts approximately 60 minutes, followed immediately by a full tasting of their products (rum and whiskey). Please bring valid, government-issued ID as all attendees must be at least 21. At the end of the tasting, guests may purchase products and merchandise at the distillery (rum cake, anyone?). We will return to TI about 6:30 pm. Cost is \$18 for members and \$20 for nonmembers. This event is currently sold out, but you can log on and [register](#) for the wait list and you will be notified if there is a cancellation.



**March 14, Cherry Blossom Festival** – 9:30 am to 2:00 pm, Tuesday, Dallas Arboretum. While the displays in North Texas are not as grand in scale as the 3,000 Yoshino cherry trees on Washington, D.C.'s National Mall, they are a lot closer! Each North Texas spring they foam with awe-inspiring pink



and white blooms at the Dallas Arboretum which is ranked one of the top ten best botanical gardens in the United States by *USA Today*. Cherry trees are one of the most beautiful flowering trees covered with puffs of pinkish cotton candy, but their blossoms only last about 10 days. (That's assuming we do not get a torrential, hail storm, a sudden freeze or a heat wave.) There are over 150 cherry trees here, reaching up to 30 feet tall, and they bloom profusely. We can walk the garden trails (or catch one of their shuttle carts) to enjoy other stunning landscapes. We'll leave at 9:30

am, tour the beautiful grounds, eat at Chili's Restaurant (on our own) and return about 2:00 pm. Prices are \$15 for members and \$17 for nonmembers. Please log on and [register](#) for this event.

**March 18, "9-to-5," The Musical** – 10:00 am – 5:00 pm Saturday, Granbury. This musical is based on the 1980 movie of the same name which was derived from a book by Patricia Resnick. It has received multiple awards and follows a hilarious turn of events as Violet, Judy and Doralee live out their wildest dream – giving their boss the boot! While he remains "otherwise engaged," the women give their workplace a makeover, taking control of the company that had always kept them down. We will leave on a bus at 10:00 am, eat lunch in Granbury (on our own) in one of the restaurants on the square, shop a little and then attend the matinee at 2:00 pm. We should be back about 5:30 pm. ## Community Involvement Events

**Community Involvement Recap:** *White Rock Center of Hope opened in 1988. Over the years, what began as a food pantry has evolved to include a clothes closet, a place for financial assistance and a resale store that helps fund the organization. The center is not affiliated with any religious organizations, though they do have church groups that volunteer. White Rock Center of Hope relies heavily on volunteers. On average, about 255 regular volunteers will spend more than 40,000 hours stocking shelves in the food pantry, helping in the resale store or working the clothes closet. On January 12, several TIAA members joined the food distribution director in packaging canned vegetables, meat, and pastas into sacks ready to be handed out to supplement client's weekly grocery needs. The rest of our members participated in the clothing distribution area helping the regular volunteers sort sacks of clothing onto racks ready for clients to select gently used clothes for their families. After a fun-filled morning of work and time to socialize with each other and the many people that came through the facility, we went next door to Sali's restaurant for a great Italian lunch.*



**February 13, Crossroads Community Services, – 8:30 am to 1:30 pm, Monday.** Crossroads has two primary goals: 1) To help ensure that all people in Dallas County have ready access to nourishing



foods; 2) To provide life-skills education that can help reduce obesity in impoverished areas. They do this work because no one, especially children, should have to experience the physical and emotional impact of missing multiple meals. Please join us at the Texins Activity Center to board a Senior Source bus at 8:30 am. Volunteers will assist Crossroads neighbors in selecting grocery items and/or helping in the clothing distribution area.
