TIAA Annual Meeting Set for May 25

The TIAA Annual Meeting to elect officers will be held this year at the recently restored 7th Floor of the J. Erik Jonsson Central Library, where a special program will be presented on the impact of the TI Founders on the City of Dallas and its institutions. We will also hear about the digital resources now available in the library system. Following the program, there will be a tour of the 7th Floor, including an opportunity to view a rare printed copy of The Declaration of Independence, one of only three known to be in existence.

Buses will run from the Texins Activity Center – leaving at 12:30 pm and returning by 3:30 pm. The meeting will start with a reception and refreshments beginning at 1:00 pm. For those who wish to drive, the downtown library is located at 1515 Young Street (the corner of Young and Ervay Streets), across from City Hall. However, making lemonade from lemons, we did enjoy the largest floral festival in the Southwest which had a theme of "Peace, Love and Flower Power" along with wonderfully cool weather that day. We feasted our eyes on tulips, daffodils, Dutch Iris, hyacinths, pansies, violas, poppies and thousands of other spring-blooming annuals and perennials. The tulips and daffodils were backed up by the pink azaleas followed closely by the bright red, multi-bloom amaryllis beds. We wound up the relaxing day by enjoying a yummy lunch (bacon jam, anyone?) at the new Smoky Rose restaurant right across the street from the Arboretum.*



March 18 found 18 of us in a bus and on the road to Granbury to attend "9-to-5, The Musical" and we had an unexpected surprise. This day was General Hiram Granbury's 186th birthday so there was a parade down Main Street with lots of Confederate flags on wagons, motorcycles and held by riders on horseback. This Confederate Army general was killed in the Civil War in 1864. Most of us grabbed a

bite to eat at one of the various restaurants on the square and also wandered around the courthouse to enjoy the market festivities. The play in the newly remodeled Granbury Opera House was well done by local performers and consisted of two acts with 22 scene changes – all of them done without a glitch! April 8, Ennis Bluebonnet Festival – 9:00 am to 4:00 pm, Saturday. Remember to bring your camera or smartphone and come with us to the "Official Bluebonnet City of Texas". April 18, Snow House Moving Museum, Fort Worth – 10:00 am to 3:00 pm, Tuesday. H.D. Snow learned the business of house moving early by working at his father's company starting at the age of 12. When Snow started his own business in the 1960s, he began traveling the country, trading tips with others movers; and, along the way, discovered that third, fourth, and fifth generation movers weren't interested in the family business. With the threat of house-moving history falling to the wayside, Snow set aside a half-acre of his business' land to display a collection of vintage artifacts and the House Moving Museum opened as a full-fledged museum in 1985. The museum carries a collection of historic moving equipment, from rollers and boomers to dollies, jacks, and bars and there are also plenty of pictures showing equipment in use, including images of buildings being pulled by horses. Mr. Snow is scheduled to meet us and tell all about the challenges he overcame in 65 years of house moving. We will ride a bus leaving at 10:00 am, take the free tour and enjoy lunch at China Flag Buffet (so bring lunch money). We plan to return to Texins about 3:00 pm.
